# HSH AT TRUDEAU VISIT PUBLIC LANDS FOR HOUSING





"Governments across Canada are sitting on surplus, underused, and vacant public lands, like empty office towers or low-rise buildings that could be built on. By unlocking more public lands for housing, we can lower the costs of construction and build more homes, faster, at prices Canadians can afford. Canada's Housing Plan lays out a strategy to unlock 3.87 million new homes across Canada by 2031, including 250,000 homes through a new Public Lands for Homes Plan," stated the event release.

As local and Halton Region officials hash out the details of what that could mean in Halton, affordable housing is welcome in Halton – home to some of the highest housing costs in all of Canada.

# HSH PARTICIPANTS BATTLE POVERTY - AND STIGMA

#### **Dear HSH Community,**

Over the past five months, we've diligently worked on negotiating long-term rentals across the region priced at \$2200 or below per month.

Our approach involves offering landlords the assurance that Home Suite Hope will act as the lease guarantor, ensuring full monthly payments. This arrangement eliminates the risk of payment default for the building owner, as we pay the





Our participants are held to a high standard through a participation agreement, requiring compliance with program requirements to maintain their housing. These requirements include passing a thorough four-step application and interview process, abstaining from active addictions, lacking any serious mental health conditions, having no ongoing court cases, and must not have a criminal conviction before or during programming. Additionally, participants are limited to a maximum of three children under 18.

These single mothers are committed to improving their financial situations and actively seek out programs like ours.

Despite offering what should be an ideal rental scenario for landlords with lower-priced units, we've encountered persistent stigma. Unfounded assumptions about the demographics of our program participants have led to repeated denials from landlords who seek "different types of clients."

We urgently seek assistance from anyone connected with apartment owners, whether in large buildings or with in-law suites, to advocate for our participants. Together, we can challenge and dismantle this damaging stigma, opening up opportunities for those striving to better their lives.

\$58,800 ONTARIO GOVERNMENT DRIVES EXPANDED HOME SUITE HOPE (HSH) SERVICES TO SINGLE-PARENT FAMILIES

Oakville, ON – On Monday,
Oakville MPP Stephen Crawford
met with the Home Suite Hope (HSH)



team to learn more about the \$58,800 Capital grant from the Ontario provincial government's **Ontario Trillium Foundation (OTF)** used to purchase a new truck that is now driving HSH's expanded reach for single parent families in Halton.

"Through the Ontario Trillium Foundation's Grant, our government continues to make investments to help support important Oakville organizations like Home Suite Hope (HSH)," said Stephen Crawford, MPP for Oakville. "It gives me great pleasure to know that the \$58.8K Capital Grant helped HSH to purchase a pickup truck allowing them to expand their reach to more single parent families and offer a significant helping hand to those in need," said the MPP.

The OTF grant funded the purchase of a pickup truck that is already enhancing program and service capacity and delivery across Halton Region to the homeless single parent-led families HSH serves. The truck provides a reliable and cost-effective way to accept donated furniture and housewares, move materials for community and program events, pick up and deliver fresh produce from the community garden, transport clients more efficiently to appointments and events and more! This supports each family in making their house a home and engages families, donors, and other community supporters in a meaningful way.

"For many years our community have been looking for ways to help our new family participants set up their new homes but the lack of vehicle has continuously been a barrier. Our participants have lost out on access to both furniture and food donations, and we have incurred high costs for truck rentals. We are just ecstatic to be able to bring more supports to our families and to divert more furniture away from landfills.", says Executive Director, Sara Cumming.

### **HSH SECURES OTF GRANT**

HSH programs encourage and support parents and their children on the journey from poverty to stability. The families come into the program, typically from local shelters or the Halton Region's by-name homelessness list, with very little in their possession, looking for a safe and secure place to call home. HSH supports and addresses the community and individual families' needs by locating and securing apartments in the community, subsidizing a portion of the rent directly to the landlord, and helping to furnish their new home. Local



not-for-profit, Safety Net, provides access to some furniture and HSH's large and generous donor base increasingly want to support these families through significant donations of furniture and household items. Unfortunately, HSH had faced challenges in accepting these kind donations as neither the families nor HSH have access to a truck to accept and move the furniture.


Now, as a successful OTF Capital grant recipient, HSH purchased a truck and has begun accepting and transporting donations. You can now see the HSH truck in the community and it's not hard to miss, as Wrapt Graphics wrapped the pickup truck with HSH's logo, contact information and HSH's tagline – "Empowering Single Parent Families" – to help spread awareness about the organization around the community. HSH is extremely grateful for this opportunity thanks to the OTF Capital Grant and looks forward to continuing to serve and empower the single parent families in the Halton Region. #### REMEMBERING BOB FLECK

Goodbye Mr. Robert Iain Fleck

It was with great sadness that I received the news of Bob's passing from his lovely wife Shelagh.

Those of you who know the story of how I became the Executive Director of Home Suite Hope know that I had trained as an academic and never imagined taking on any role outside of the post-secondary sector. It was with much angst that I took on this role and began the (now six-year) process of engaging with the community that surrounds the organization.

I first met Bob in 2018 when we were attempting to bring more awareness to the

organization and our mission. Fleck Productions came to us with the idea of producing videos from the perspectives of our participants. At the time, Bob and I had several meetings about how his creative vision could meet the needs of HSH. It was during this time that my great fondness for Mr. Fleck began and our first of many collaborations was born, <u>Home Suite Hope Journey</u>.

Over the next six years Bob became one of my biggest supporters. He took an avid interest in not just my role at HSH, but also my academic endeavours. He checked in on me regularly, congratulating me on my work in Africa and my book publications and he always remembered to ask about my four daughters and two dogs. He teased me relentlessly for my love of the exclamation mark in an email and I believe got a little chuckle out of my smart mouth and quickwitted humour. In return, he boasted about his amazing wife and two daughters, sent me pictures of his pup, and spoke in complete admiration and pride of his 'older brother.'

Bob continued to reach out to see what he could do for HSH and was always coming up with new video project ideas: **About Home Suite Hope**, **Why Invest in Home Suite Hope**, **Our Supporters**.


# IN THE COMMUNITY BOB FLECK WAS A FRIEND TO HSH

### A 'SOUPER' VOLUNTEER



# NAVIGATING FINANCIAL WATERS: A CLOSER LOOK AT HOME SUITE HOPE'S FINANCES

In the final blog post of the series, we provide complete transparency about Home Suite Hope's assets.

In the realm of non-profit organizations, financial transparency is paramount. Every grant application, whether from government agencies, foundations, corporations, or service clubs, necessitates a prevue into the audited statements of the organization. These statements serve as a testament to fiscal responsibility and financial health. However, beyond the surface-level numbers lie intricate stories of strategic investments and prudent decision-making.



Home Suite Hope's audited statements not only showcase its fiscal soundness but also reveal the diverse array of assets, including physical property, cash, and investments. One notable addition to our physical assets beyond our IT is a 2023 Ford Maverick, acquired through a grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation to enhance service delivery.

As of April 2024, Home Suite Hope boasts approximately \$1,036,000 in liquid assets, with an anticipated budget close to \$1,000,000 for the year. While a significant portion of the budget is secured through external agencies and reserves, a deficit of \$515,000 necessitates fundraising efforts to bridge the gap. Despite the apparent surplus in liquid assets, prudent financial planning dictates maintaining a three-month cash reserve, amounting to approximately \$200,000.

Home Suite Hope's commitment to expanding its services, such as supporting young single mothers and providing trade education programs, has attracted targeted donations. The organization has judiciously invested these funds, primarily in Guaranteed Investment Certificates (GICs), to ensure sustained support for its initiatives. Notably, a portion of these investments will be reallocated to supplement the budget for the current fiscal year, emphasizing strategic resource management. In addition, last year we spent the entire year focused on increasing our capacity to offer affordable housing. The money we have accumulated from these efforts has also been invested into GICs.

A core tenet of Home Suite Hope's operations is its policy of providing direct assistance to participants rather than cash handouts. The organization pays landlords directly and has an account at Sheridan College for all of the participants' parking and books. Extra supports are given in the form of grocery, transportation and clothing gift cards. We have found over the last three years that we need a minimum of \$10,000 of these supports annually and at times (during the pandemic and inflation crisis) we have hit closer to \$20,000. These gift cards show up on our statements as cash.



# NAVIGATING FINANCIAL WATERS: A CLOSER LOOK AT HOME SUITE HOPE'S FINANCES

One of the most significant investments in Home Suite Hope's portfolio is the Pooled Fund Investments at the Oakville Community Foundation (\$416,000) stemming from proceeds generated by selling an old property. While initially earmarked for housing initiatives, these investments now serve as a crucial resource amidst a worsening housing crisis. With government funding cuts looming and housing costs skyrocketing, the

organization recognizes the imperative of bolstering its reserves to sustain its mission.

To sum this up, we currently have approximately \$200,000 for our three month cash-reserve, \$20,000 in participant supports through gift cards, \$136,000 in deferred revenue, and \$680,000 for housing supports in our reserves. In the face of a national housing crisis, these funds will be critical in supporting the long term housing stability of our participants. The core tenant of Homeward Bound Halton is housing first—our participants must have access to safe, affordable and stable housing for them to do the hard work in all of the other areas of their lives. Without access to housing the entire program in jeopardy.

Our financial strategy exemplifies a delicate balance between fiscal responsibility and social impact. By meticulously managing assets, investing strategically, and prioritizing the needs of our participants, the organization has navigated challenges with resilience and foresight. As we confront the evolving landscape of social services cuts at a time of high levels of unaffordability, we urge funders to recognize the need for surplus for long-term sustainability.


