Home #1 - Mother Ginger House

Home Suite Hope's **Industry Council** plays a critical role in the development and success of the Homeward Bound Halton program. The Industry Council is a group of senior executives from a variety of fields with decision-making authority who meet throughout the Homeward Bound Halton program to support the professional advancement of participants in the program.

The Industry Council is a group made up of eight to 12 representatives from organizations including private sector businesses, non-profit and public sector employers, community champions with influence in the local community and representatives from employment services at the local college, municipality or community services organization.



A key success factor for **Homeward Bound Halton** participants is that the college programs available through

the program are aligned to the local labour market opportunities with the organizations that sit on the Industry Council. 






AFFORDABLE HOUSING CRISIS

National Housing Day was recognized November 22 to raise awareness about the importance of safe, affordable, and stable housing for all Canadians and to acknowledge housing challenges faced by vulnerable groups – like the single parents HSH serves - and to discuss solutions.

Since 2000, National Housing Day has been dedicated to highlighting the critical role of housing in individual and community well-being. It is a call to action - a reminder for communities, organizations, and governments to work



together on solutions to housing crises, affordability issues and homelessness. Housing provides stability: A home is a foundation for health, safety, and the ability to thrive, providing stability for families and individuals – a basic to which many Canadians, including our single parent intake clients, do not have access. The day encourages a collective effort across sectors and levels of government to find and implement new, creative solutions for housing.

On Friday, November 21 Halton's National Housing Day Forum 2025 was hosted in Burlington by Community Development Halton. Thanks to support from Halton Region and the United Way of Halton Hamilton (UWHH) more than 160 community-minded citizens, community and nonprofit leaders gathered for an inspiring morning of local impact stories, interactive small group sessions, and information on concrete ways to be part of ensuring everyone's right to housing.



A panel of local leaders advocating for changes in Halton's housing landscape included: Dr. Daryl Kaytor, Director of Housing, Halton Region (at left with HSH Interim Director of Development & Program Manager Nikkian Hanson-Daley); Dr. Steven Barrow and CDH Peer Researcher, CDH Learning for Voice of Lived Experience Project; Cathy Greven, Halton Community of Faith Advocates; Garth Brown, Mary's Ark; and, Dr. Mary Vaccaro, Faculty School of Social Work, Gendered Perspectives on Housing and Homelessness. The panel also included two individuals with lived experience spending over two years homeless in Halton and just recently becoming housed.





HOUSING PLAN RECEIVES PUSHBACK

As the struggle to access affordable housing is at crisis point, Home Suite Hope Executive Director Sara Cumming and Halton Women's Place Executive Director Laurie Hepburn were at the Town of Oakville's Planning Council meeting November 17 where a proposal to build a six-storey affordable housing community hub oat 1493 Sixth Line, south of Upper Middle Road, received significant pushback.

The complex envisions assisting single parents and women affected by domestic violence by offering affordable rental rates and working with a host of key community players including **Home Suite Hope**, **Halton Women's Place** and **Halton Region**, **Sheridan College**, **Community Development Halton**, **Food for Life** and the **YMCA Oakville**.

While the proposal is in line with Town of Oakville and Region of Halton affordable housing goals, area residents raised concerns about congestion, traffic and the size of the proposed building.

Both <u>Oakville News</u> and <u>Inside Halton</u> reported on the debate – set to go before Town staff for review and then go back before council.

The need for affordable housing is dire locally – and local families and women are up against a monumental hurdle as they try to rebuild their lives.

OAKVILLE RENTS HIGHEST IN ONTARIO



t is not news to Home Suite Hope that Oakville is an extremely expensive community – never mind for those who are struggling.

We read with interest – and alarm - Oakville News journalist Tyler Collins' recent story headlined: Oakville surpasses Toronto as most expensive place to rent in Ontario. Collins reports that "New figures show that renters are paying more on average to live in Oakville than almost anywhere else in Canada — including the traditionally pricey Toronto"

HSH works to get single parents facing poverty and homelessness housed and then provides wraparound support as they move through a two-year post-secondary diploma program in order to secure employment and a stable income and home. HSH's stellar success rates have of late been increasingly impeded by the lack of affordable housing, in Oakville and across Halton. This **Oakville News** story shows just what our families are up against as they try to stabilize and rebuild their lives in their home community. STAFF NEWS SARA'S NEWEST RESEARCH PROJECT

Sheridan College is advancing solutions to some of today's most pressing social challenges — in healthcare, gender equity, and homelessness — through three applied research projects supported by more than \$1 million in federal funding from the College and Community Social Innovation Fund (CCSIF). Home Suite Hope's Executive Director Dr. Sara Cumming, a Professor of Sociology at Sheridan and Canada's only applied sociologist, is colleading the gender equity project.



Natural Sciences and Engineering Council of Canada (NSERC) funding, will provide each project up to \$360,000 over three years to support development of innovative solutions to pressing social issues and community needs: amplifying the voices of palliative care patients to improve clinical trainings, empowering women with sustainable pathways to leadership and examining the impact of mobile primary care units for the homeless and underhoused.

Embedded Meaning: Adding Voices of Patients Receiving Palliative Care in Clinical Training, led by Dr. Karen Slonim through Generator at Sheridan's Centre for Elder Research, will enhance education around palliative approaches to care, advanced care planning and serious illness conversations by adding the human connection into theory-based teachings through the co-creation of videos with persons at end-of-life. These videos will be part of an open-source library for healthcare professionals and educators and integrated into training.

RESEARCH PROJECTS INCLUDE WOMEN & HOMELESSNESS

Women comprise nearly half of Canada's labour force and earn advanced degrees at higher rates than men yet they continue to hold fewer leadership roles across industry sectors. Community Ideas Factory: Pathways to Potential Co-Leaders Dr. Sara Cumming and Dr. Jessica Pulis, professors in Sheridan's Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, are tackling this gap by uncovering and dismantling systemic barriers that hold women back in the workplace.

While existing research shows early life experiences can play a crucial role, this project will explore additional under-examined influences such as family dynamics, mentorship and extracurricular activities in bringing up future women leaders. The project is exploring the gap that persists in female leadership, especially in STEM and other male-dominated fields with industry partners Balsam Advisory, Trillium Health Partners, WeirFoulds LLP and Women of Influence +. Findings will be used to create evidence-based leadership development strategies and eventually integrated into schools and extracurricular programs.



With over 80,000 Ontarians experiencing homelessness as of 2024, Innovations in Healthcare: Offering Primary Care Services for the Homeless and Underhoused Through a Mobile Community Health Centre, is led by Dr. Daphene Francis through Sheridan's Faculty of Applied Health and Community Studies, along with co-investigator Dr. Linda Frost from York University's School of Nursing. It aims to provide insights into how best to meet the healthcare needs of unhoused individuals.

CELEBRATING THE SECTOR

Celebrating the Sector - an inaugural event presented by the new Impact Halton Coalition and Community Development Halton - was held November 28 in Burlington.

Those attending the sold-out event, including HSH staff members, were updated on the state of the nonprofit sector in Halton Region and were able to share stories of impact and hold conversations for action.



Last year's event aimed to explore the state of Halton nonprofits based on data released by **Ontario's Nonprofit Network** in 2024.

The challenges of a silved sector and the need to work together to advocate for nonprofit needs were identified as top issues so following last year's event, a team of nonprofit leaders came together to organize nonprofit advocacy in Halton into a formal coalition.



Impact Halton Coalition has been formalizing over the past year and this year's Celebrating the Sector event marked the official launch date of the coalition. Its immediate objectives are to spread the word about the new group, share the impact and challenges of the sector and explore ways for nonprofits' leaders to advocate together.
