

NEW CANADIAN CITIZENS!

SH participant Robin and her daughter Leanne officially became Canadian citizens in March. This was an incredible achievement for Robin, who is searching for an internship opportunity in IT as she journeys from poverty to stability through HSH's four-year Homeward Bound Halton program.

Robin grew up on the Island of Antigua, and moved to Canada in 2014 - four years after having her daughter who lives with Cerebral Palsy and uses a wheelchair.

"We arrived in Canada in November 2014 without a plan of how we'd stay in the country. My reason for moving was based on my daughter's medical condition. In 2015, we applied for permanent residency and maintained our visitor status until our PR application was approved in December 2018. The years of waiting for our permanent residence were very challenging in every way. Not being able to work for such a long time caused a lot of financial hardship for me and my family in Antigua,



who were trying their best to support us. I was told by many, including immigration lawyers, medical professionals and personnel, who worked closely with government officials, that becoming a permanent resident was not possible because of my daughter's condition. So becoming a citizen of this country is way more than I thought could be possible for us. In 2021, I applied for citizenship and became Canadian Citizens in March 2022," said Robin.

From living in an unfinished basement, hotels and friends, Robin found a basement apartment and carried her daughter and her wheelchair up and down stairs for years. Then Robin was introduced to HSH.

"My favourite thing about being attached to Home Suite Hope is knowing there are dedicated staff working to give me the tools and guidance needed to ensure I become independent and able to provide for my home. I hope to secure employment in the IT field, and five years from now, would like to have full-time employment and be able to start saving to purchase or build a fully-accessible home and vehicle, said Robin.

"I'm in Sheridan College's Computer Systems Technician – Software Engineering program. This course takes me through the complete development cycle of creating an application, including research done before development, coding, testing of the app, deployment and maintenance, etc. Other core skills I will acquire are programming and software development in Java, C and C#, web technologies and web application development, database management and administration and network administration and security. Unfortunately, the course does not have a co-op, and I am eager to start putting the skills I have learned so far to use through a summer internship.

"HSH is very unique. It's about guiding us through this stage of our lives. Being a part of this journey goes beyond the value of a coin. It enriches the lives of all who are involved, said Robin.

LANDING THAT SUMMER INTERNSHIP

Last August, Home Suite Hope participant Monell looked on feeling 'beyond proud' as her daughter Kyjuana was awarded the 2021 William G. Davis Scholarship by FCT Canada.

For numerous years, FCT has presented the scholarship in partnership with HSH.

Now, Kyjuana has landed a summer internship with FCT.

Kyjuana has a keen interest in law, both Canadian and international, and a history of community involvement and leadership at school and in her church. Kyjuana said receiving the scholarship made her feel special.

Kyjuana speaks four languages including French, Spanish and Korean, in the hopes that she can eventually reach more individuals around the world. She is studying political science at Western University.

Home Suite Hope is grateful for the support **FCT Canada** has provided through the annual scholarship it offers to a child of an HSH participant parent.

For the last three years, FCT has presented the William G. Davis Scholarship in partnership with HSH. The scholarship is named for the late Honourable William G. Davis, a chairman of FCT's board, former education minister and Ontario's 18th Premier, and since its inception in 2015, reflects his passion for education and investing in youth.

HSH also thanks **St. Jude's Anglican Church**, which supports a runner-up recognition in HSH's annual scholarship call-out to participants' children.

PARTNER IN CHANGE

MARK MCLAUGHLIN

Retired Chartered Professional Accountant (CPA) Mark McLaughlin likes to play tennis, windsurf and paddle, but says he really only needs a few T-shirts and a pair of shorts to do so – so he's investing some of his 'retirement spending money' to becoming an HSH Partner in Change.

HSH has partners in the roughly \$48,075 per family annual cost of this program – from Halton Region, Sheridan College, the Oakville YMCA and the Oakville Community Foundation, to individual donors and corporations like Sagen. Still, the bottom line shows a \$9,534 funding gap – so Mark is



stepping in to cover that gap over four years as one of HSH's newest Partners in Change. "The concept of investing in an individual with a family and the group of experienced HSH staff and their success rate sounded like a pretty good return to me," said Mark.

SAGEN CANADA

As early as 2014, Sagen (formerly Genworth Canada), had a solid partnership with HSH.

Besides the Sagen team rolling up their sleeves in HSH's Blueberry Fields Community Garden, in 2017, Sagen was an event partner in the Sleep in Your Car for Hope 2017: Oakville Cares event. Sagen committed \$25,000 in corporate financial support of HSH in 2021-22 and took on the Backto-School Campaign, providing backpacks full of

supplies for back to school. Sagen is also behind a Back-to-School Laptop Loaner Program, HSH's Sagen Savings Program – a four-part Virtual Life Skills Module for college graduates moving into employment, and a Sagen Matching Incentive Program offering new graduates up to \$1,000 during their first year after graduating from HSH's programs.

IAN MARTIN GROUP - SYDNEY WESTON

A chance meeting in 2018 at Home Suite Hope's community garden, Blueberry Fields, laid the seeds of a partnership between Home Suite Hope and Ian Martin Group that has blossomed.

When Ian Martin Group's Sydney Weston, Stewardship Council member and HSH liaison, saw her coworkers' response to the garden volunteer opportunity, she knew Ian Martin Group had made

a connection. Now, an official corporate partner of HSH's, Ian Martin Group has continued seeing its employees volunteer at Blueberry Fields – there is often a wait list. For two years, HSH has successfully applied and won a grant from Ian Martin Group's North America Foundation, The Meaningful Work Foundation. Ian Martin Group invests 10 per cent of its North American profits into grants administered by its foundation worldwide.

lan Martin Group employees were also busy for B-Corp Week, not only rolling up sleeves in Blueberry Fields, but also launching the Ian Martin Basic Needs Program, which Sydney anticipates becoming a quarterly effort. The company and its employees worked with Kits for a Cause to purchase, assemble and then deliver Summer Survival Kits to HSH single-parent participants and their families.

This year will also mark the second that Ian Martin Group is involved in HSH's signature fundraiser Empty Bowls. Last year, company employees were in the warehouse packing and then helping deliver soup kits over a late October weekend as HSH co-hosted its COVID-19 edition of the fundraiser, Empty Bowls at Home.

Most recently, Ian Martin Group has become a Partner in Change, supporting the nearly \$10,000 funding gap in the \$48,000 annual cost of supporting a single parent-led family through a four-year journey from poverty to stability. Sydney also volunteers on the HSH Industry Council.

FUNDRAISING FRIEND

The idea of not giving someone a fish, but teaching them to fish is what first attracted Peter Kolisnyk, an Engel & Völkers real estate broker, to Home Suite Hope (HSH). More than a decade later – after agreeing to join HSH as Interim Executive Director and later serving as Board Chair – Peter is proud to see that HSH not only survived but thrives.

Peter took the lead on a major restructuring and drastic changes that put HSH on solid ground. He also joined the HSH board serving as Chair and Past-Chair for the better part of a decade. He tackled the Ironman Muskoka and raised \$10,000 above his \$50,000



goal for HSH. He then raised another \$40,000 in a Sleep in Your Car event that saw him sleep in a car for seven nights. Two subsequent Sleep in Your Car events, hosted at the YMCA of Oakville and the Infinity Oakville car dealership, also raised significant funds for HSH.




GETTING TO KNOW HSH



Blueberry Fields Community Garden (Seasonal) - May through October

Volunteers work in the community garden doing weeding, planting, harvesting, etc. spring through September.

Empty Bowls Annual Fundraiser – mid-to-late October

Volunteers help packing soup kits prior to delivery and/or help in delivering soups according to predetermined routes.

Hope4Holidays Annual Holiday Fundraiser – late November to mid-December

Volunteer groups could sponsor a family by purchasing gifts for family members as outlined on a wish list from the family or help with gift wrapping gifts prior to delivery.

Calls to Action

Groups can assist with specific calls to action, as needed, to meet needs that arise ie. Collection of toiletries, cleaning supplies, gift cards.

Life Skills Facilitators
